
MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Crazy Construction Facts

- In 1997, a group of enthusiasts began building a castle in France, using only materials, tools and techniques available in the 13th century (800 years ago). The project is scheduled to be completed sometime in the 2020s.
- In 1983 hundreds of workers broke a world record by building a 3 bedroom home in just 3 hours. It was later sold to buyers who weren't told about the home's origin. The home was an instant nightmare: uneven slab, burst pipes, flawed roof, mismatched paint, buckled walls, crooked doors, faulty sewer, etc.
- A guy implied he was going to build a 480 ft. skyscraper but labeled all the plans as 480". Then he had it built 40' tall as per the plans, pocketed the investment money and won in court because he didn't technically defraud anyone. The Newby-McMahon Building is the World's Smallest Skyscraper.
- Sears used to sell entire houses in a 'Do It Yourselves' kit.
- A Chinese construction company built a 30-story hotel in 15 days. The hotel is energy efficient, has air 20 times cleaner than comparable hotels, and can withstand earthquakes up to magnitude 9.
- U.S. bridges and roads are being built by Chinese firms not American because it's "faster and cheaper."
- The Mohawk Indians were employed by construction companies in NYC since they did not fear heights.



HEALTH & SAFETY: Driving in the Snow and Ice

If you find yourself driving in inclement winter weather, stay alert, slow down and stay in control. These are the three key elements to safe driving in the snow and ice. Here are a few other tips for driving in the snow and ice:

- If you think you may be heading into snow or there is a possibility of driving in the snow, make sure you do a maintenance check on your vehicle before making the trip. Check the vehicle battery, belts and hoses, anti-freeze, oil, lights, brakes, heater and defroster and check the exhaust system for leaks which may allow carbon monoxide to enter the vehicle if it becomes stranded in the snow.
- Plan your route ahead of time and give yourself extra travel time. Make sure someone knows your travel plans.
- Wear comfortable clothing that does not restrict your movement while at the wheel. Keep warm clothing available for when you exit the vehicle or if your vehicle become stranded.
- Always clear any snow and ice from all windows, lights, mirrors, roof, hood, and trunk lid before driving. After starting the vehicle wait for the interior windows to be clear of fog visibility will not be obstructed.
- Make sure there is sufficient windshield washer fluid in the vehicle reservoir and that it is rated for freezing temperatures.
- It takes longer to stop on slippery surfaces, so add additional time to the three-second rule.
- Know the proper handling procedures for a skidding vehicle. Turn into the direction of the skid.
- Slowdown in snow and icy conditions, make turns slowly, and make all starts and stops slow and smooth.
- Remember that bridges and overpasses may freeze before the regular travel lanes of a roadway. Watch out for black ice, areas of the roadway that appear black and shiny and where your vehicle can suddenly lose traction. Slowdown in these areas and apply the brakes slow and steady if needed.
- If you get stuck or stranded, don't panic. Stay with your vehicle for safety and warmth. Wait for help to arrive. If you have a cell phone and are in an area with cell phone service, try calling for help. Try to always know your exact locations while driving.
- Keep your clothing dry. Wet clothing can lead to dangerous loss of body heat.

Winter Driving Survival Kit

It's a good idea to keep a winter survival kit in your vehicle if you might be traveling into an area where you could encounter snow. Having essential supplies can provide some comfort and safety for you and your passengers. The following items are recommended for your winter driving survival kit:

- Ice scraper/snowbrush
- Shovel
- Sand or other type of traction aid
- Tow rope or chain
- Booster cables
- Road flares or warning lights
- Flashlight and batteries
- First aid kit
- Fire extinguisher
- Small tool kit
- Extra clothing and foot wear



- Non-perishable energy foods, like chocolate or granola bars, juice, instant coffee, tea, soup, and bottled water
- · Candles and a small tin can to hold the candle
- Water proof matches
